Since 2019 the Journal of the Royal Society of Western Australia is fully open-access.

Digitised Journals from 1899

We are very grateful to the Museum of Victoria who continue to digitise the Journals of The Royal Society of Western Australia and precursor societies which are now freely available online via The Biodiversity Heritage Library which provides free access to digitised biological literature through a global consortium of contributing libraries and affiliated literature digitisation projects. Links to these historical Journals are given on the Society's website under Publications/Journal/Past Volumes from 1899.

Library

Printed copies of the Journals of The Royal Society of Western Australia (since 1914), and precursor societies (since 1899), can be accessed from the RSWA Library housed within the Western Australian Museum at Welshpool. The Museum Library is one of the oldest government libraries in the State with collection strengths in the areas of the natural sciences such as ornithology, palaeontology, malacology, marine invertebrates, earth sciences, Australian history, anthropology and archaeology, maritime archaeology, materials conservation and museology. The resources of both libraries are available to the public for research. A description of the collection and contact details for our Librarian Bobbie Bruce are available on the Society's website.

Sponsoring Science

During the year the Society sponsored a prize, as detailed on our website, for the Ecology, Environment and Evolution session at the 28th Combined Biological Sciences Meeting held at The University of Western Australia on 31 August 2018. The winning student for this session Tina Berry from the Trace and Environmental DNA Laboratory at Curtin University, for the poster Marine Environmental DNA Reveals Spatial and Temporal Community Changes in Zooplankton'.

Membership

We are pleased to have welcomed a number of new members. This includes members that paid to attend the RSWA Symposium and the RSWA Symposium presenters. Key note presenters and student posters presenters were given one year membership, as a thank you, for their contribution to the success of the Symposium. Student Medal recipients also receive a one year Gift Membership. Unfortunately, between 2015 and 2017, no Student Medal recipient has continued their membership subscription to the Society. Biased on this trend it is expected that the number of Student Members will decrease significantly in the 2019-2020 financial year, as many of the student members, that presented poster at the RSWA Symposium are unlikely to renew their subscription.

As of the 30 June 2019 there are a total of 7 Honorary Members (including one Honorary/Life), 6 Life Members, 112 Ordinary Members, and 57 Student Members (included five 2017 Student Medal recipients).

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Treasurer's Report to AGM on 19 August 2019

For the year ended 30 June 2019, The Royal Society of Western Australia finished with a net surplus of \$2,791 compared to the previous year net surplus of \$3,726. Total Revenues and Expenses were significantly higher due to the RSWA Symposium held at The University Club of Western Australia on Friday 27 and Saturday 28 July 2018. There were 122 registrations, with 47 attending the Saturday night dinner. The event had an overall loss to RSWA of \$2,274 considered acceptable given the Society had accumulated surpluses totalling \$13,946 for the previous three years.

Total Revenue this year is \$55,002 compared to last year \$8,590:-

- Total Symposium Revenue was \$41,855 comprising \$30,180 Registrations/Dinner, \$10,600 Sponsorships received, and \$1,075 direct Memberships. Other Events Income was \$Nil as all Talks during the year were provided free of charge.
- Membership Subscriptions \$11,895 are higher compared to last year \$7,302 due mainly to the fact that 57 members this year prepaid in June 2019 their subscriptions for 2019-2020, compared to 33 last year. Individual subscription fees have remained unchanged for five years 2014-15, 2015-16, 2016-17, 2017-18 and 2018-19 being at \$95 for Ordinary members and \$55 for Students. The RSWA Symposium in July 2018 added an extra 14 ordinary members and 44 student members, since all presenters who registered, including the student authors of the posters and the authors and co-authors of the papers, automatically were given free membership for the one year ended 30 June 2019. At year end there are 182 members (Ordinary 112, Students 57, Honorary and/or Life 13) compared to the previous year end total of 139 members (Ordinary 102, Students 23, Gift 1, Honorary and/or Life 13).
- Journals Copyright Income from the Copyright Agency was \$996.
- Interest Received \$1,115 was from two interest bearing accounts with Bankwest, and benefited from interest on prepaid registrations received for the Symposium.

Total Expenses this year is \$52,211 compared to last year \$4,864:-

- Total Symposium Expenses were \$44,129 comprising \$33,469 paid to The University Club, \$10,000 for ten \$1,000 Poster Award Winners, and \$660 for transaction fees and incidentals.
 Other Event Expenses were \$95 compared to \$170 last year. Thanks to the Board of the Botanic Gardens and Parks Authority, who allow the Society to hold meetings and talks on the Kings Park premises without charge.
- Operating Expenses \$7,197 are higher than last year \$3,635, and consist of Audit \$715; Awards and Prizes \$3,697 (including \$3,397 for 13 medals, 8 presented in 2018, 5 to present at the 2019 AGM); Bank and Transaction Fees \$763; Insurance \$1,120 (Association Liability Insurance \$332; Personal Accident Insurance \$342; Public Liability Insurance \$446); and Other \$902 including \$130 for Australia Post Office Box Rental, \$87 to use the Scholastica Platform for article submissions, and \$685 for the Constant Contact subscription.
- Journal Expenses \$1,110 for 5 articles are higher than last year \$740 and comprised applicable costs of format and layout for online RSWA Volumes 101 and 102.
- Website Expenses \$340 are marginally higher than last year \$319. The Society is again very thankful to Peter Williamson who this year has continued, together with the Treasurer, to manage the RSWA website on a voluntary basis.
- Expenses continue to be kept low due to significant support from volunteers.

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the Year Ended 30 June 2019

1 Statement of significant accounting policies

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (WA) 2015. The Management Committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

a) Income Tax

The Association is exempt from income tax under the provisions of Section 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

b) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short term highly liquid investments with original maturities of six months or less.

c) Revenue and Other Income

Grant revenue is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income when the entity obtains control of the grant and it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the entity and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably.

The Royal Society of Western Australia receives non-reciprocal contributions of assets from the government and other parties for zero or a nominal value. These assets are recognised at fair value on the date of acquisition in the statement of financial position, with a corresponding amount of income recognised in the profit or loss.

Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received.

Membership Subscriptions are recognised as revenue when received.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customers.

d) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Up to 17 October 2017, revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position. Effective from 17 October 2017 the Society has had no GST transactions - Refer Note 6.

e) Investments

Investment includes equity securities. The Association recognises and measures this investment at cost.

f) Expenses

Audit fee and Insurance expenditure is recognised as an expense when paid. All other expenses are recorded on an accruals basis.

GST Payables

Under the Australian Taxation Office requirements, non-profit organisations with a GST turnover of less than \$150,000 per year need not register for GST. Given the position of The Royal Society of Western Australia (RSWA), after considering advice given, it was resolved by the RSWA Council on 16 October 2017 that it was advantageous to deregister RSWA for GST purposes. The GST registration was then cancelled and effective as of 17 October 2017. Outstanding GST to that date was paid in full, with a \$Nil balance and no GST transactions since that time.
